Here are a few basic reasons for fear, or if you prefer butterflies, our if you prefer, nerves.

- 1. We don't know the material,... which usually means we will embarrass ourselves in front of others... We can see the two bars near the end of the piece that we only sometimes play.... and every part of our being is wondering if we will be able to play it when we get there. WE Simply don't "OWN" the whole piece of music.
- 2. Our personality is one that believes that we are never good enough.

The best solution whenever possible seems to be to really "own" the piece of music. To own a piece of music means you could play it by memory even if your internal dialogue was thinking about getting home to your family. Know the type of venue and the size of the audience. Try to acclimate to your performance situation and don't worry about your body by mistaking butterflies for fear. It is just your desire to do the best you can, and the body gears up and magnifies you mind to see and hear more clearly. You will hear things so acutely you will hear things you have never heard before and the audience will not notice. Imagine an audience listening to you every time you practice. And don't forget if you have, or make, the chance, is to play your piece in front of as many people in as many situations as you can.
